FINANCE COUNCIL REPORT – FEBRUARY 2023

At the time of my last report, several months ago, Andrea Machicado was just settling in to the Business Manager's role. Since then, she has become an integral and valuable part of the parish family.

A new Planned Giving Programme commenced in July. Unfortunately, there wasn't much of an uptake in giving or new members. A sub-committee of the Finance Council will be looking at different strategies for the programme.

• A "TAP and GO" system of electronic payment will be installed in the church porch soon, providing another option for giving.



- The Diocesan Parish Accounting Process we joined last year is now bedded down and proving worthwhile and fairly user-friendly!
- We engaged the services of a property consultant to investigate options in dealing with land and property of the parish. The report has now been supplied, so we will be using this as a guide in our forward planning of sales or lease of parish assets.
- Some pleasant news we received late last year was the announcement that Catholic Development Fund had increased interest rates. It has launched a Parish Investment Account that will pay 5% interest.

Overall we finished 2022 in a reasonable financial position. We budgeted for a deficit of around \$20,000, but finished up with a deficit less than that.

A copy of our "Income and Expenditure" will be up in the church porch shortly along with the 2023 Budget.

By the time this issue goes out we'll have met for our first meeting this year and have welcomed Bill Spurling (our former honorary auditor) on to the Finance Council.

Wishing you every blessing for the coming year and thanking all on the Council for last years' efforts.

Members were honoured to have State Chairman, Brother Paul Hawkes, attend the meeting. Bro Paul is also the author of the recently released 100year history of the Knights in South Australia. It is a



well-written and very professionally produced 288page book entitled: *A bold story well proven – one hundred years of the Knights of the Southern Cross in South Australia.*

The main subjects discussed included The Rosary Prayer Crusade and it's advancement in South Australia and, the highlight of the evening, a 40minute Zoom meeting with John Kirkland of the Perth -based Children's Harm prevention programme. John gave an introduction to the Fathering Programme founded in WA in 2013. The programme is designed to connect fathers and father-figures to their sons and daughters in various after-hour activities in and after school so that fathers become an active part of a child's development. It also provides opportunity for fathers to mix with other fathers at their school. One of the branch Parish Schools will be considered to start the programme in our area.

- rugs, quilts, scarves, beanies
- toy bags (for the Conference Christmas distribution) and bags for the layettes are also made.

We thank all those who donate wool, fabric or give financial help to keep us going. Articles mostly are taken to the Vinnies Shops where the needy can access via vouchers from the St Vincent de Paul conference. The shops are very important in raising funds for the purchase of food and family requirements.

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Easter Lily

Tradition states that the Easter Lily originated in the Garden of Eden from the teardrops of Eve, that spread when she and Adam were cast out of the garden. These were believed to be tears of repentance.



Historians and Bible scholars say that the lily has always been highly regarded in the Christian Church.

Jesus even references the flowers in Luke 12:27, stating "Consider the lilies, how they grow. They toil not, they spin not; and yet I say unto you that Solomon in all of his glory, was not arrayed like one of these." Legend has it that, after Our Lord's death and resurrection, lilies were found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane, where Jesus is said to have prayed before his crucifixion. It is believed that they sprung up from a drop of sweat from his brow when His head was bent in prayer.

In Easter celebrations, the lily represents Christ's resurrection, and thus new birth and new life. These delicate white blooms can be viewed as pure, innocent and untainted by the world

The flower itself is used in various ways to tell the resurrection story. The bulb is buried in the ground; as a representation of Christ's tomb.

The trumpet shaped flowers also announce life after death, since bulbed flowers often regrow year after year, according to the religious source All About Jesus.

And the trumpet shape signifies the angel Gabriel's trumpet call.

McAuley Community School

He was instrumental in curriculum and cultural development during the amalgamation of the Sacred Heart and Marymount campuses, leaving behind a legacy of traditions which remain today. At Sacred Heart College, he held many formal positions, including Director of Arts, Leader of Learning and Professional Practice whilst also working closely with the Mission leaders, Marist Solidarity Team and Directors of Marist Mission, developing school celebrations and initiatives, outreach and solidarity projects.

In 2022, he left Sacred Heart College to work as Assistant Principal at All Saints Catholic Primary School in Seaford with two portfolios, APRIM and Wellbeing. In the context of Catholic Education, he finds these two portfolios marry together beautifully. He is now enjoying his time at McAuley, and has found the school to be welcoming, with the Mercy Charism embedded in every aspect of the school.

Mandatory Notifiers

Just a reminder to <u>all</u> that as a Volunteers in our parish that you are a "Mandated Notifier", which means that when you undertake your role as a parish volunteer, if you come across any indicators, suspicions or information that suggest a child may be in danger of physical, mental or sexual abuse, you are legally obligated to report this to the Child Abuse Report Line (CARL) on

13 14 78.

Failure to report is an offence under the Children and Young people (Safety) Act, 2017, and currently carries a maximum penalty of \$10,000. This is an individual fine, not an organizational one.

If you become aware of any situation or are unsure of how to deal with it, please talk to Nirmanthi (Child Safe Contact person) or the Child Protection Unit of the Adelaide Catholic Archdiocese on 8210 8140 or email childprotection@adelaide.catholic.org.au

We require all those who Volunteer in our parish to undertake Child Protection training, so that they are aware of their obligations. Thank you.

Did you hear the one about...

"How do you mean?" asked one of the friends. "Well, she continued. "At university, George did a communications course and I studied drama. So, he communicates really well and I act like I'm listening."

Cleaning the church—fulfilling an early calling

Your first job—do you recall what it was? I certainly do. At around 13 years of age, I began working alongside my mother cleaning apartment units. Over 50 years later, I'm still cleaning—no longer apartment units but my own house—and, each month, St Martin de Porres Church.

My step-father and mother struggled to rent a modest threebedroom unit within a sprawling 450-unit apartment complex (featuring a mini golf course, two tennis courts and a large swimming pool) near Philadelphia,



Pennsylvania. Having befriended the manager of the apartment complex, my mother offered to help with the never-ending task of cleaning units (after units had been vacated and before new tenants moved in). Our family didn't have a lot of money, so my mother's bargain was that I would, along with my two younger brothers, help her clean units during the summer to defray the cost of the swimming pool fees. With our help, she could clean more units per week than usual. *Clean units from early morning during the school*

holidays, spend the afternoon in the cool, sparkling pool during the hot, humid summer—yes!

My mother was a hard worker and a tough taskmaster. As her eldest, I was expected to do a very good job vacuuming carpets



and cleaning ceiling tiles. I didn't mind the vacuuming (or her exacting inspections!), but cleaning the ceiling tiles—and repositioning them in the kitchen and bathroom areas of units, was especially challenging. Ceiling tiles in the early 1970s were hard to clean and even more temperamental to reposition.

When Carrie and I, and our two children, relocated from Brisbane to Hallett Cove in late 2004, we began attending Mass at St Martin de Porres Church (I was later received into the Church in March 2006). Immediately, I noticed that our church's internal ceiling featured ceiling tiles similar to those that I had encountered in those Pennsylvania apartment units so many years ago. I truly love our church—but I try not to look up during Mass!

I've been cleaning the church as part of a small crew of 2-3 parishioners for several years. Because I'm relatively young, fit and healthy, I don't mind vacuuming and other cleaning tasks. It usually takes about an hour for our crew to clean the church. Best of all, we don't clean the ceiling tiles!

We've often heard appeals for volunteers to be rostered to assist with various ministries that serve our parish community. Reading, counting collections, cleaning, etc. What might you be able to contribute, mindful that to assist the community is not a 'forever commitment'. Our contribution to the gathered community is an expression of our baptismal vocation. Even cleaning! Consider contributing what you can for a time. We celebrate Mass not as passive spectators but as active participants in the life of the Church.
