The new members of the Parish pastoral Council have settled in well and the Council has been busy over the last few months.

The Council acknowledges and supports the excellent work of various groups that operate within the Parish and over recent meetings we have been invitina representatives from these groups to meet with us and update us on their activities. To date, we have had presentations from representatives of the Diocesan Assembly Group, the Baptism Preparation Team, the Bereavement Team, Knights of the Southern Cross and the Vinnies Sewing and Knitting Group.

At each meeting we also receive and consider reports from the Parish Priest, McAuley School and Christ the King School as well as the Finance Council and look to work with them and support them.

Some recent decisions of the Council include approval for purchase of a defibrillator and upgrading the church sound system.

A small subcommittee is also working on improving the Parish's social media presence including establishing a Facebook page.

An update from the Parish administration:

First, I would like to thank the Lord for all his blessings and one of them is working for the Parish, I am very happy to be surrounded by very friendly and lovely people. Thanks to everyone for your unconditional support and friendship.

We are almost a quarter away from the end of this year and we had a list of Parish needs presented in May, that I would like to inform the status of:

Church door repairs and upgrades have been done and are providing more security now complaining with work-safe and healthy regulations.

The Kitchen sink at the Activity Centre has been repaired and has a new hot water system. The dishwasher will be available as soon as the quotes are presented and approved by the Finance Council in the next meeting.

The front garden irrigation is ready, and we will always thank the parishioner who donated the funds for this purpose.

A new digital door lock will be available for the Church and the Hall in September and please be alert to future communications in this regard.

Finally, after having inspections by three different suppliers and having received different proposals to improve the sound system, the Finance Council with the support of the Pastoral Council has approved the improvements that suit the actual needs of the Church. We expect to have the improvements very soon once the selected supplier can proceed with the job.

The Church ceiling repairs have been postponed because it was decided to have an assessment of the roof's actual condition and fix the roof with a bigger budget. After the roof is fixed there will be some other tasks to think of regarding the ceiling. However, we had some maintenance on the Roof and sealed the leaks. We are only waiting for the roof repairer to come back to fix one more leak found at the Sacristy.

Overall, all the items are in progress or have been already executed.

I would not like to skip to thank you for using the tap & go machine, which had a very good acceptance and is now regularly used every weekend.

PARISH FINANCE COUNCIL REPORT

SEPTEMBER 2023

Since my last report we have accepted the resignation of Robert Taylor from the Finance Council because of other commitments. Robert has contributed much and on behalf of the Finance Council and the Parish I offer him our thanks and gratitude for his work.

At our recent August meeting main discussion centred around maintenance and replacement and repair of equipment, namely:

 the sound system in the church, church doors and their locking, Garden work in the grounds and water tank re location.

• funding has been released for the purchase of a presbytery – so now the search is on for a suitable property.

Planned Giving is fairly well on target. Unpledged and credit card payments are behind.

Reports and returns on the Tap and Go Machine in the church foyer indicate it has been accepted by parishioners.

In a meeting with TUTTI, they indicated their strong desire to continue and to strengthen our contract. We are still looking at some options but indicated an answer will be forthcoming within the next 12 months.

The area once occupied by the Antioch Group has been leased to TUTTI on a weekly hire basis. Room is available to accommodate any future parish youth group.

Other items discussed were fencing, security (gates, doors and locking) and repairs to the Church roof and ceiling.

Thanks to our Business Manager for her work in keeping the organization running.

We are always on the lookout for new members.

New Garden Area

Have you noticed a new patch of green, buffalo grass, 80 square meters by size. Remember the fenced off area behind the Activity Centre. The area was occupied by the then Men's Shed, once the Presbytery was sold. History tells us the Vinnies Sewing had a shed for storage as did Bill have a shed with maintenance equipment like ride on lawn mower etc.



Well they went when the Men's Shed now Men's Fellowship developed the area in the carpark which was the cricket nets for the St Theresa's School.

It has taken a few years for someone to dress up the area in question.

Look out through the northern window of McAuley Room. We have a new outdoor community area.

After a lot of planning and individual efforts to transform this area we have finally have an attractive, professionally, revamped area for all to enjoy.

Thanks go to our resident painter, Keith Moorman who solicited help from his sons to replace paths of pavers, planted trees along fence line, placed fruit trees in garden beds with the support from Peter Jankovick.

To dress up the rest of the area we would be looking in the order of some \$10,000 or more. Work required like digging up 20 tonne of gravel and dolomite, dumping same. Replacing this with 20 tonne of sandy loam, on top of this is 80 square metres of the above Kings Pride Buffalo grass, supported by automatic sprinkler system installed under the grass.

The big bombers are the equipment, 5 tonne Up-truck and a 1.7tonne excavator.

Then comes the professionals, the guys that said yes we will give you a hand. Without this type of labour of love, it just wouldn't have happened.





I had spoken to my son-in-law P'ouli Tongia one day of this picture I had and knew he had the capacity and knowhow to take on the task and make the area pop. (He and my son Matthew were main players in the revamped grassed area under the gazebo. Yes the paving, the grass, the garden bed.)

Months later he asked me if I still wanted him to do what has been now done. From there the above was spawned.

I will need a 3 tonne truck and an excavator says Pouli, and and and . The date it will be done is Saturday 2nd September.

P'ouli advised his friend Devita was going to help. Devita is the son-in-law of Mary Hyland, he is another strong and extremely capable hands on new Aussie, also born in the beautiful islands of Tonga.

After I had solicited quotes for all materials and equipment. After time with Andrea to clear the financials, we are getting close to the day.

Cancel the truck hire says P'ouli, my work will supply one. Phew.

In the meantime our guitarist singer from sat night Mass David McCabe. 'Cancel the excavator' says this reared plumber by trade. His son has offered his excavator for the Saturday. Devita will operate it.

Saturday comes, Devita is at the gate ready for work at some time prior to 6am. Pouli is on the phone "Are you there yet", I am on my way now". Then comes David McCabe, then Keith Moorman, both stayed for the entire day offering physical support whist Pouli doing all the trucking of materials and re grading of existing paving etc, etc.

Others to throw in their support, Ootsi, Allan Press, Peter Jankovic who offered a hand, I knocked him back, then advised he could purchase another lemon tree because the first one he donated had died.

We should have taken a movie of this work. All completed in one day. There was great cooperation. All enjoyed working long hours, full of concentration and professional work ethics, wrapped up in fun.

Rejoicing in the Gift of the Lord's Day

I have earnestly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer (Luke 22.15).

I decided to come to Mass today. With my thoughts still settling, I knell to pray in the silent church. After some time, a random feeling stirs my heart: is my presence here simply the result of my decision? The inertia of simple habit, a sense of Christian duty or the desire for consoling fellowship? *Hmm, I'm not sure.* Have I somehow recalled the Lord's faithful invitation, always tender, to draw near? Something is unfolding within, perhaps beyond me, so I pray: *Dear Lord, help me.*

I gaze at the Crucifix: how is God observing me as my pre-Mass meditation splutters to life? Well, a most unanticipated flash of grace! Might God be actively longing for me to participate in this Mass? No longer am I the main protagonist in my movement toward the Mass! Relieved and renewed, my vague feelings morph into insightful energy. The Paschal Candle springs to mind—its burning flame and serene glow evoke God's passionate love for all of God's beloved creation, and more wondrously, its sublime restoration. Now a different spirit animates—gentle, teeming with fruitfulness.

My soul delights in realising that God's Spirit is drawing me like a magnet, though never against my will. God's love lures by attraction. From this peaceful centre I discern that Jesus is present with me now—God's Spirit wordlessly yearning within. Feelings of joy and gratitude envelop as if I'm bobbing in the midst of a vast ocean. Softly, a favourite verse echoes: 'The Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God' (Romans 8.26-27). Purified through the unceasing drama of God's earnest desire for all, the very heart of my heart's decision to attend Mass is revealed.

My prayer quietly resumes: Lord Jesus, truly you thirst for me—and now I'm here encountering you, freshly astonished that you want me to share in your great prayer of thanksgiving to the Father, the only true act of worship. Every word, gesture, glance and feeling of your earthly ministry is now active and near to me in your Word and Sacrament. Together with my sisters and brothers, 'on earth as it is in heaven' (+ sign of the cross): Glory be to the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Amen.

I take my seat. The Mass has begun surprisingly in my heart. Soon I will be invited to stand with my sisters and brothers for the opening hymn and procession, to rejoice as one in the gift of the Lord's Day.
