

HOLY THURSDAY - 28th March

Holy Thursday begins our Easter Triduum and commemorates the Last Supper Jesus had with his disciples. It is a time of thanksgiving for the gift of the Eucharist and also a time when we thank God for calling us to participate in Christ's priestly ministry through the Sacrament of Baptism.



The Gospel story recalls Jesus at the Last Supper during which he washes his disciples feet. Through this action He calls us into loving service for all people.

After the ceremony you are invited to pray at the Altar of Repose at the back of the Church.

GOOD FRIDAY - 29th March

St Joseph's Liturgy 3pm

Good Friday commemorates the suffering and death of Jesus on the Cross. The litural of Good Friday is in four parts: the Litural of the Word, the Veneration of the Cross, General Intercessions, Holy Communion.

Today as we gather to walk with Jesus, on the journey to his death, we ask him to share with us something of the pain, the struggle, the despair and the hope of that journey. We ask him to help us understand the depth and boundlessness of God's love and mercy for us. We ask Jesus for healing in our own pain, despair and suffering.

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EASTER VIGIL - Saturday 30th April

St Joseph's

The Easter Vigil is the most solemn and important of all the Church's celebrations. It is the feast of Christ's resurrection.

St Paul said: "If Christ had not been raised, then our preaching and your faith would be in vain". This night we come to the Church to celebrate our lives, lives which have a deeper meaning because of Christ's victory.

The liturgy for the Easter Vigil is arranged in three parts:

7.30pm

Service of Light: We begin in darkness, as if we were in the empty tomb waiting for the resurrection. The lighting of the Paschal Candle brings us out of the darkness.

Liturgy of the Word: Our readings recall God's saving deeds in history: how he saved his people in ages past. Let us pray that our God will bring each of us to the fullness of redemption. We will all be invited to renew our baptismal promises.

Liturgy of the Eucharist: We bring our gifts in the form of bread and wine which will become for us the body and blood of Jesus Christ. The whole Church is called to the table which the Lord has prepared through his death and resurrection.

Please do NOT bring your own candles. (candles will be provided for the renewal of Baptismal Promises.)
