PARISH FINANCE COUNCIL REPORT

In my final report last year I forecast some "big challenges and some rewards" in the coming year and hoped that we would be "just about on budget." The first part was correct, the rest a bit off the mark.

The Tutti Arts project, which had occupied a lot of our time and effort, was occupied in March and officially opened in the middle of the year. Because they were set back in their fundraising efforts by COVID-19, they approached us requesting an extension of their contract from 5 to 7 years. This contract was signed by the Archbishop and parish recently.

Unfortunately, our occupation of the old buildings has been much more expensive than we budgeted for. Plant and Services had been run down and extensive electrical, communication and plumbing work had to be done.

On a pleasing note, the relocation of groups into the buildings has been well received and the outdoor area has been converted into a very attractive garden and recreation space.



COVID-19 has damaged our budget too. With the closure of the church and limited attendances, combined with restricted employment, our planned giving and loose coin collections, on which the parish depends [and the first collection], have suffered. Quite a few people moved from envelope giving to electronic giving and that has been a blessing, but the old plate offering has suffered badly. We have benefited from the Job Keeper for some of our wages and we haven't had to contribute to the Diocesan Co-responsibility Fund.

The building proposal for Mens' Fellowship, lodged with Holdfast Bay Council some weeks ago, has been challenged by some neighbours concerned at the amount of traffic. It is hoped that this project will be wrapped up soon and the men able to relocate and settle in.

So far we haven't been able to let out the ground floor offices but have now resumed contact with an agent. We are hopeful that the parish will be able to purchase a housing unit offered by deceased parishioners at a favourable price. This will be income generating. The matter of a presbytery for the parish priest is being investigated and on-going.

During the year we farewelled Les Sobieray,

Leon Welsby and only latterly Brian Burns. We welcomed Peter Whelan and Mandy Bosson and retained Paul Angley and me. Fr Michael attends as President and Parish Priest, Jenny McCabe as Business Manager and we were pleased to have Christina Jonas, as Parish Pastoral Council Chair present at meetings. I would like to thank all members for their input and dedication. It has been a tough year. I would particularly wish to thank Jenny McCabe for her output and tenacity. She started the year operating remotely from Port Douglas!! We are fortunate to have great people on our staff.

One Charism, Many Paths

Mercy Associate

Mandy Bosson has recently become a Mercy Associate and, together with two others, will form a new Mercy Associate group which will meet online. The group of three potential Associates started meeting online for formation once per month back in 2018, when Zoom was still relatively unheard of!



Meeting online for formation was the only option available

for Mandy, who lives in Brighton, Anne, who lives in Melbourne and Natalia, who lives in St Petersburg, Russia. The conversations during formation were rich and interesting given the different church and cultural contexts; from exploring Catherine McAuley's life and ministry to discussing what it means to live out the charism of Mercy today. Communities of Mercy can develop deep relationships, even in the online space.

Catherine McAuley's words — "It began with 2, Sister Doyle and I" — reveal the small beginnings of what has now become an international association of Sisters of Mercy. Inspired by her pioneering spirit, the Mercy Associates movement too continues to grow and adapt to new challenges, including how to enable membership for people living in places where there are no existing groups.

Mandy and Natalia made their commitments together as Mercy Associates in a very special online Commitment Ceremony on 26th November. Along with Mandy and Natalia, invited guests included Sr Marietta Green and Sr Mary Mutlow. (Together with Sr Marie Ralph and Sr Pat Philips, they had been a great inspiration to Mandy on her spiritual journey with the Mercy family). This wonderful ceremony was a moving event for all involved, and of course particularly for Mandy and Natalia.

Mandy's journey continues, as she forms part of a faith community which seeks to follow in Catherine McCauley's footsteps. The story of the new online Mercy Associates group is unusual and owes much to the willingness of all to venture into the unknown, just as Catherine did when she opened the House of Mercy in 1827. As the Mercy Associates move forward, it is hoped that more people will join the small emerging group, and that the possibilities offered by online formation and meetings will provide new ways for people to connect with Mercy.

Now SA tourism = Once its tasted...... like more of it Can't move around much = Care and concern for Neighbour increased






