Our Parish Vision

Fr Dominick Okwadha

I was born on the 29th April, 1968 in Kenya. I am the 2nd last of 4 boys and 2 girls.

I was ordained as a Roman Catholic Priest on the 9th July, 2000 in the Archdiocese of Kigali, Rwanda.

I have a Bachelor of Arts in Philosophy and a Bachelor of Arts in Sacred Theology, Religious Studies from the University of Eastern Africa, in Nairobi, Kenya.

Whilst in Rwanda I served in 3 different parishes, after which I was sent to Barcelona in Spain to study for my Masters in Counselling Psychology. Returning back to Rwanda I was appointed to serve in the Psychiatric hospital sponsored by the Brothers of Charity as a psychologist and a chaplain, offering pastoral care and counselling to patients and hospital staff. I also taught Counselling Psychology to the novices of the Brothers of Charity, and teaching social studies and communication skills at St Vincent's Minor Seminary in Ndera, until the end of January, 2020.

I came to Australia on the 4th Feb, 2020, where I spent the first 6 months of transition in Adelaide. After 6 months I was appointed Assistant Parish Priest of St Pauls Catholic Church in Mt Gambier (part of the South Eastern Deanery). 2 months ago, I was appointed to Brighton & Hallett Cove parishes as Assistant Parish priest to Fr Michael.

Fr Dominick is interested to getting to know parishioners and talking to people and can offer advice if needed. His qualifications as a psychologist are not recognised by the Australian government, but he is willing to meet with and counsel in his role as Assistant priest. Around the grounds

Thank you to the volunteers who have created a lovely green space and garden area for parishioners outside on the western side of the activity centre. An area that can be enjoyed by all.

You might even consider sitting on the new benches in a special space created in memory of Fr Sean McGearty. A place for privacy and reflection. The black rope playground climbing equipment has been removed for safety reasons. The remaining play equipment has been assessed and is compliant after a few repairs were made. Children using the equipment must be supervised by an adult. If you are in that area you might like to send to the office any ideas you have for the space left behind after the removal of the climbing tower. Thank you to the two volunteers who look after the roses outside of the McAuley room the garden area looks lovely with the white roses in full bloom. I can inform you that at long last we have received the OK from the Holdfast Bay Council and building authority to proceed with a shed for the Men's Group to use. The shed has been ordered from Stratco and will be erected on the concrete slab on the western side of the car park off Old Beach Rd. At this stage we do not know when the shed will be delivered and then constructed. Once the shed is up we have organised for it to have lighting, power, water installed and made compliant with WHS before occupancy. Trenching for electrical and water was completed recently and the community garden beds have been started. It has taken a long time to get to this point but the end is in sight.

When the shed is ready for occupancy the men will move their things from the current location and move the lovely wooden fence they erected to the new area to give them privacy. Eventually we hope to have the vacated men's group area cleared and garden/ reflection areas created behind the Activity Centre.

The maintenance committee have been busy with overseeing and arranging quite a few projects. There will be an access ramp installed in the car park area to allow easier access from the car park to the parish, the current step will be blocked off. The car park will be lined marked for car parking including 4 spaces for access parking.

The lighting in the Columbarium area has been upgraded, the fish ponds cleaned out. We are currently working with Tutti to do some repairs to the old school building roof and gutters.

No doubt you would have noticed the 'for lease' sign in front of the entrance into what was the school admin area. The admin area has been painted and freshened up ready for commercial lease.

Overall last year we finished much better than forecast or hoped! The future looked a bit bleak mid-way through the year when collections were impossible due to church closures) and interest rates came down further. Circumstances did change to our advantage. Because of the Job Keeper payments the Diocese waived the Co-Responsibility Fund (about \$40,000) and the staff wages were supplemented.

So while our budgeted income dropped by \$55,000 (Planned Giving down \$10,000, Second plate collection down \$12,000), our expenses dropped by a large amount too, giving us a surplus over the year.

By way of contrast, with the restoration of the Co-Responsibility Fund, withdrawal of the Job Keeper allowance and limited income from interest and rental, the budget shown for this year will be in deficit.

The main item of discussion at our February meeting was about property – suitable accommodation for the Parish Priest, sales and purchase and leasing of other assets. We sought and had a meeting with representatives of the Diocesan Finance and Property Office. This has helped in the future planning process.

Other items for our February meeting were:

- New interest rates announced by the Church Development Fund from 1st January 2021. - Parish Operating Account 0.15% and Term investment down to 2%.
- Property Investments (where we have most funds invested) down to 2.5% (from 6% a few years ago).
- The Men's Fellowship Shed work is progressing. Erectors have looked at the site and plumbing and electrical services installed.
- Some different approaches to our Planned Giving Project will be investigated for this year's campaign.
- Since that meeting we have had to regretfully accept the resignation of Mandy Bosson from the Finance Council for health reasons. Mandy joined us in a difficult year and we are sad to see her go. We thank her for her contribution.
- Once again, in winding up, I ask you to consider joining the Parish Finance Council (or encouraging someone else). There are 5 official meetings per year (with an occasional special meeting). You don't have to be an accountant or a financial wizard! You can contact Jenny McCabe or Fr Michael at the Parish Office (8296 7292), or me on 8295 6966 to discuss the role.

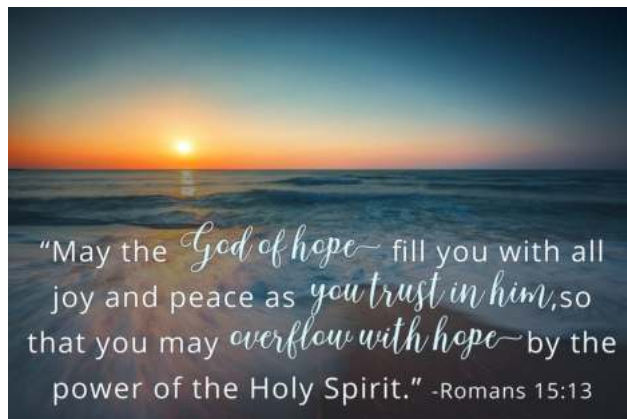

The highlight of last Wednesday's meeting was a talk by Guest Speaker Police Sgt Peter Benn. He went on to trace his 20-year journey from Police Academy to his present rank of Police Sergeant and outlined the wide range of tasks, knowledge, expertise and responsibilities one acquired along the way.

Overall, it was a most interesting and educative talk, delivered by a very accomplished speaker.

Christ the King School News



This year Christ the King School's theme is 'To Flourish, To Grow'. Our first mass of the year reflected this. The prayers reflected our own desire to flourish and grow but also to be stewards of the World God desires. As an ongoing symbol of this during mass Fr Michael distributed to each class a plant for their prayer space. As each class tends to their plant they will build their understanding of stewardship.



We continued our connection with the parish by inviting Fr Dominick to visit us and get to know our community. During his visit to each class he introduced himself and bravely offered to answer any questions. The student were keen amongst many other questions to find out his age, where he was born and why he became a priest. He continued getting to know us with a shared morning tea with the staff.

The first 3 weeks of the year focus on 'CTK Matters'. This year we weaved 'To Flourish, To Grow' through the weeks. Each class workshopped their class expectations, explored our 5 main School Dispositions. Looked closely at the Good Samaritan story, explored stewardship of our yard and surrounds, began our social skills programme and enjoyed many 'getting to know you' activities.

Our annual Sports Day on Friday 12th March held on the Sacred Heart Snr Oval was a great success. The weather was wonderful, and many parents were able to spectate (our first big spectator event for nearly 12 months), and volunteer on the P&F BBQ. St Therese were successful winning the Jim Murphy Spirit Cup, with St Patrick winning the overall event.



Our Yr2-5 classes ventured over to the Marion Swimming pool for their annual swimming lessons and had a wonderful week full of water safety and swimming skills. There was also quite a lot of resilience building, maintain equipment and trying new experiences such as diving into the deep pool.



Fasting

However, the scriptures also speak of other forms of fasting.

Helping the poor.

Looking after those in need.

Fasting from gossip.

Fasting from unhealthy sexual practices.

Visiting the lonely.

Looking after refugees.

Being respectful.

Helping the 'powerless'.

And so many other ways of going out of our comfort zone to help others.

Fasting without loving is not helpful. It is love that gives meaning to fasting.

Love is the most powerful way of practising self-discipline. It is called commitment.

Neighbourhood Masses



Neighbourhood Masses at McAuley Community School began last week in the chapel, with the Reception Neighbourhood leading a beautiful mass about the love

of God. This week, our 5/6 learners will celebrate the Feast of St Joseph and the Year of St Joseph at St Joseph's Church. Next week, the 3/4 learners will lead a Mass for the Annunciation of the Lord.

Lent

To celebrate **Shrove Tuesday** our beautiful community volunteered to cook and serve hundreds of pancakes on Shrove Tuesday. We had more than 20 helpers and it was a lovely 'Pancakes in the Plaza' morning. The gold coin donation for a pancake was for Caritas projects as part of our Project Compassion appeal.



Ash Wednesday on 17 February, marked the beginning of Lent, a time of fasting and prayer over the next 40 days until Easter. We were called into Lent by being signed with ashes, reminding us of God's mercy in the challenge to simplify our lives and turn

to the Gospel on the journey to Easter. Each Neighbourhood took part in an Ash Wednesday Liturgy in our Chapel and learners were marked with ashes on their hands.

Throughout the weeks of Lent, staff and learners have been engaging in Lenten reflection and prayer. We have utilised the resource 'Laudato Si Lent'. This has supported us to embark upon a journey of ecological conversion through reflection, repentance, and renewal. Together.



Enhancing Catholic School Identity

This year, McAuley Community School is engaging with Leuven University and Catholic Education to undertake the Enhancing Catholic Identity Project. Through engaging in this project, we will gain a better understanding how our Catholic Identity is expressed in work and practice here at McAuley Community School. We have started the data gathering process from our community (learners, families and staff).

Staff Commissioning Mass

On Sunday 14 March, the McAuley staff was commissioned to their role of imparting knowledge and nurturing the faith of the children entrusted to their care. We enjoyed the opportunity for the staff to also formally meet Fr Dominick.



Commitment to Ecology

The work of establishing eco leaders and establishing an ecology steering committee at McAuley Community School has begun. This committee will use the 'Catholic Education South Australia's Call to Ecological Conversion and Action plan' to co-construct and drive the strategic vision and actions for ecology at the school. We have also been exploring our waste at the school and looking at ways we can take a whole school approach to reducing, reusing and recycling.

On Friday 5 March, this learning on ecology was brought into the community when our whole school participated in Clean Up Australia Day. Following our cleaning up of the school and Mawson Oval, learners responded to the provocation of...How will you step up? It was an inspiring and thought provoking day for all. McAuley Community School have also been involved in the 'Adopt-a-Spot' scheme through the City of Holdfast Council. Through this scheme, learners and educators volunteer their time to strive to minimise marine debris entering the ocean through regular collections & removal of waste at self-designated areas. Our school community has adopted Wattle Reserve and the stretch of coast in front of the reserve.

The Fringe came to the parish Activity Centre at the end of February with the 2 Mary's putting on an excellent show with songs relating to modes of travel. Numbers attending were reduced due to COVID but both shows were booked out. If you missed their show this year maybe we can encourage them to come back next year. 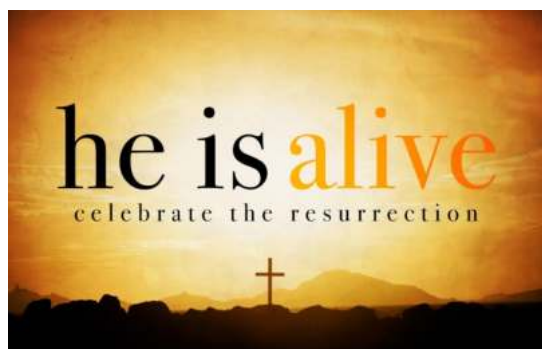
