What a vibrant and active parish we have even with COVID. We continue to be active in our Parish and engage with as many parishioners as possible. Since our last Community Newsletter, we have had our Catechumen Shauna Thomas was initiated into our

Our Masses for Christmas morning will be 8.30am and 10am like a normal Sunday. This is so we can accommodate as many people as possible. We will still have our vigil Mass at 10.00pm.

company, all this being in a comfortable, welcoming environment.



As of the 21 August 2020 a COVID Marshal is a person who must supervise prescribed operations eg Mass Parish attendance, meetings/gatherings Having Marshals present is a SA Government requirement. The Marshal supports the Parish in their effort to help keep the parish attendees to social distance and observe the COVID safe guidelines. You will notice that there is a Marshal at each Parish Mass - they are clearly identified by their Hi Vis vest and Marshal badge. Fr Peter's homily

Many years ago, when I was still a relatively young priest, I was present when Fr Neil Kelly celebrated his 25th Anniversary at Elizabeth.

I remember part of his homily explaining why he was still a priest after 25 years. He misquoted scripture by saying he was too proud to beg and he was unable to dig.

I also remember him saying that the secret of staying with the priesthood was that one got up in the morning, did what had to be done, and went to bed at night.

In my naivety, I thought that not's hard. I can do that. The trouble is with the bit between getting up and going back to bed.

People come into your life. People who are living with all the joys and hopes, the sorrows and problems of humanity.

I thought I am the priest.... I am the one they are coming to see. That was a huge mistake. They were coming to find God or Jesus or the Holy Spirit or Mary our Good Mother.

The image Pope Francis uses of the church as a field hospital offers a reality check to life and ministry.

The Eucharist that we celebrate together is not a prize for the perfect. It is a powerful medicine and nourishment for the weak, including myself. It is in

Eucharist and in God's word we find hope and joy, a spirit of perseverance and direction. It is in the lives of people we find ourselves and our God. Very early on I was drawn to the words of Psalm 46: Be Still and Know that I am God. We easily get lost in busyness and troubles and disappointments. We need to find stillness let God in.



That is why the First reading is a favourite. Elijah, God's prophet has taken things into his own hands and stuffed up. He is fleeing for his life, confused and disillusioned. God comes to him not in the power of wind and earthquake and fire, but in the sound of a gentle breeze.



The Good Shepherd Psalm means so much after I saw a shepherd in the Holy Land. He was walking along with his few sheep. Being an Aussie I looked for the sheepdog. There wasn't one. There was an amazing relationship between the shepherd and sheep that both were caught up in that kept them together.

That is when celibacy came to life. It is not just a life of no sex. It is about relationships with God and people.

I used to feel really confused and rattled when I tried

working out about loving God. I wanted to, I knew I was supposed to, but I was really not sure whether what I was doing was enough. It didn't really feel all that personal. The apostle John found me and said the love of God was not about our love for him, but his love for us. Life became a whole

lot better. It is much easier to let God love us, but it is not without it's response from us.

That made the Gospel feel a whole lot less intimidating. My namesake, Peter, hadn't had the chance to read John's letter because he hadn't written it yet. When Jesus asked Peter if he loved him, Peter.., and I, could say: the important thing is Lord, that you love me.

That is not a good scriptural expose, but it helped me. Our lives, whoever we are and whatever we do, are similar in so many ways. Life is about living love, holding hope, trusting faith, accepting who we are in all our strengths and weaknesses. It is about knowing we are loved by our Father/Mother God, that there is purpose, and a

place to where we are

going.

We, together, called to be a light in darkness, to live hope where hope seems useless, to hold on in faith when it seems easier to let go, to be the hands and feet and smile and love of the one who called us into life.



Finance Council Report

We recently welcomed a new member in Mandy Bosson to the Council and welcomed back Brian Burns after a protracted illness. They join Peter Whelan, who joined us in June, Paul Angley and me along with Fr Michael and Jenny McCabe from the Parish Team, to make up the Finance Council.

Following an approach by TUTTI several weeks ago, we have been negotiating with them on their proposal to extend the 5 year lease by another 2 years. In conjunction with the Parish Pastoral Council we agreed and the new agreement is ready for signing. This move gives TUTTI more time to settle in and puts our agreement on a more commercial basis.

Planned and other Giving to the parish has fallen to some extent because of the closure and now partial opening of the church for services. More people now operate using direct debit or credit card giving. Because collection plates have been off limits, collection boxes for 1st, 2nd and special collections have been placed on a pillar in the church porch. Thanks to everyone continuing to support the parish.

Plans for the SHED for new accommodation for the Men's Fellowship are about to be re-submitted to the Holdfast Bay Council, so hopefully this will be underway soon. This is to be located on the concrete slab in the car park.

Other business has revolved around buildings.

- (1) We've discussed the repairs and maintenance needed on the St Teresa's property (some quite extensive and expensive!).
- (2) The suitability of Fr Michael's accommodation and
- (3) the commercial listing of the ground floor offices of the school, a project that we didn't pursue during business closedown, but are about to resume.

Again I pay tribute to the staff of the parish team who have done so much extra, under a lot of pressure in the changing rules and vagaries imposed by COVID.




Knight's nights



A Jubilee for the Earth 1st September – 4th October

The Season of Creation is a time to renew our relationship with our Creator and all creation through repenting, repairing, and rejoicing together. During the Season of Creation, we join our sisters and brothers in the ecumenical family in prayer and action for our common home.

This year, amid crises that have shaken our world, we're awakened to the urgent need to heal our relationships with creation and each other. During the season this year, we enter a time of restoration and hope, a jubilee for our Earth, that requires radically new ways of living with creation.

The Season of Creation unites the world's 2.2 billion Christians around one shared purpose. With so much injustice all around us, now is the time for Christians everywhere to come together and show the world how to love each other and creation.

As Catholics we are called by Pope Francis to encourage the People of God to accelerate their walks towards new paths for the Church and for an integral ecology by planning activities for the Season of Creation. In keeping with the theme for 2020, drawn from the Old Testament, we can focus on reducing our impacts on Earth and on the most vulnerable people. These might include a special Eucharist or pilgrimage walk, sustainability practices or advocacy initiatives to respond to "the cry of the Earth and the cry of the poor."

The Adelaide and Port Pirie Dioceses are in the process of developing a "Council for Integral Ecology" to encourage all parishioners and Catholic bodies to embrace the teaching of Laudato Si' in practical and faithful ways.

On Sunday 4th October we ask that you bring to Mass with you a pot plant that can be blessed during Mass. We will be blessing a tree for our new Reflection garden during the 10am Mass, this will be planted after the Mass, you are all invited to come visit our new Reflection garden and stay for Morning tea

SHC wedding facts

I have been asked some historical questions about weddings in the SHC chapel, and I have done some research. Thought you might be interested to hear what I found out.

The first weddings were held in the chapel in 1948. From 1948 –2019 there have been 4365 Catholic weddings celebrated in the chapel. The years with the greatest number of weddings were 1993 & 1996 with 114 weddings for the year. 1997 & 2001 had 113 weddings for the year. With only 52 weekends in the year this represents more than 2 weddings every single weekend for the year. Last year (2019) there were only 16 weddings held in the chapel, with the number to be much lower this year due to COVID restrictions.

For it matters not, how much we own, the cars... the house...the cash. What matters is how we live and love and how we spend our dash.


So think about this long and hard; are there things you'd like to change? For you never know how much time is left that can still be rearranged.
